In this unit, you will learn about how music shapes three primary storytelling media: opera, musical theatre, and film.







Opera is a form of storytelling in which singing is combined with theatre or stage drama, orchestral music, visual art (in the form of production design and costuming), and dance. Italian composers first experimented with this in the early 1600s, but its popularity soon spread throughout all of Europe. Composers from different countries developed their own national styles.


Opera halls became social hubs for the elite to rub elbows and show off their wealth. Virtuoso performers (females were known as prima donnas) became superstars.



Cadenza/Coloratura

Opera is the pinnacle of musical performance and artistry, so opera performers are the best of their age. A cadenza is a musical passage that is gives the singer space to show off their talent and virtuosity. The orchestra gets out of the way and the vocalist performs incredible feats of range and technicality. Coloratura is vocal music that is embellished with trills, extreme ranges, and fast notes and runs. It can be featured in a cadenza, but it is also usually present throughout an aria or the entire opera.



Leitmotif

A leitmotif is a musical phrase or theme that is appears throughout the opera and is associated with a character, object, idea, emotion, or theme. When an audience hears the leitmotif, it is their cue that one of these is in play in the scene.

Libretto

The inverted of an oneral consists of the words lynds that the singers sing in the opera. The composer works with the librertist to set these words to music. Sometimes, the librertist or complete







The Broadway Musical



The Broadway musical is an American invention. Using songs, dancing, costumes, scenery, lighting, and spoken dialogue, it grew out of operettas (small-scale, light-hearted, entertaining operas) and vaudeville to entertain American audiences that did not want to tolerate long-winded and complex operas.

Early pioneers of musicals were George Gerswhin, Jerome Kern, and Cole Porter in the 1920s and '30s, with works such as *Lady Be Good, Show Boat*, and *Anything Goes* which reflected the iazz style. In the following decades. Richard Rogers and Oscar Hammerstein. Leonard Bernstein. and Stephen Sondheim further developed the musical by

harmonies and sociopolitical drama, in the late 20th century. Andrew Lloyd Webber joined Broadway musical royalty with Cats, The Phantom of the Opera



Music Sets the Tone

Music permeates opera - the art form is defined by music such that every word is sung. On the other end of the dramatic spectrum is a play, which contains entirely spoken dialogue. In between the two sits musical theatre, which combines spoken dialogue and drama with music that conveys the emotional development of the story.










"In most films music is brought in at the end, after the picture is more or less locked, to amplify the emotions the filmmaker wants you to feel." - Ken Burns

From the very beginning of motion pictures, music has been an essential companion. Before movies had sound, live music was played to bring life to the pictures. A pianist or organist would improvise a score live, watching the film along with the audience and interpreting the mood of the scene with appropriate music. What a feat!


Thomas Edison and his partners played a critical role in the inventions that drove filmmaking, first by creating the Kinetoscope and later the Vitascope, before providing musicians with "cue sheets" so they could plan appropriate music. In 1915, an entire live orchestra was assembled to accompany the showing of the silent film *The Birth of a Nation*.

Despite being "the most controversial film ever made in the United States," and, "the most reprehensibly racist film in Hollywood history," its technical innovations had a profound and lasting impact on the film industry - including the permanent fixture of the orchestra as an essential to film.

After Edison's invention of the Vitaphone, sound and music could be synced to otherwise silent motion pictures, and the composition of original music for film became worthwhile in pursuit of the perfect dramatic impact.

Studying opera and musical theatre aids in understanding the evolution of film music. Overtures and incidental music (music that accompanies a dramatic performance but is less important than the drama occurring) influenced early film composers.





Film > The Film Composing Pro...

The Film Composing Process



- 1. The composer views the completed film.
- 2. The composer and director work together to "spot" the film, or determine which scenes should have music.
- 3. The composer views each spotted sequence several times to get a feel for their respective moods.
- 4. The composer sketches musical ideas and must rapidly "score" them, or orchestrate them for a full ensemble.
- 5. The music is recorded while the conductor watches the film and syncs up the music to important moments in the film.
- 6. The music recording is mixed and mastered.
- 7. The music recording is combined with all other sound elements of the film and "dubbed" into one soundtrack, adjusting volumes so that dialogue and other sounds can be heard over the music.




